Sabbatical

The definition of the word *sabbatical* is something like "an extended period of leave from one's customary work or job for rest, training or the development of new skills." A sabbatical leave can last anywhere from one month to a year, is fully paid and comes with the promise that the same job will be there upon return. Historically, sabbatical leave is a common practice for academics and clergy where educators and pastors take time away from professing and pastoring to rest, recharge, and research. Today, sabbatical time is also being offered in other vocational in other fields as employers have found planned time away beneficial for their companies and employees alike.

The Vermont Conference of the United Church of Christ recommends that UCC clergy take regular sabbaticals. The Ministerial Excellence, Support & Authorization Ministry Team of the UCC writes the following:

A sabbatical is a significant time of rest, renewal, and refreshment for pastors. For pastors, the sabbatical is time to nourish their relationship with God, recommit to their call, and provide renewed vision and focus for ministry. A sabbatical is not a vacation, but it does provide time away from the daily work of ministry. Sabbatical leave may include study or a project, but its first goal is reconnecting with one's sense of vocation through rest, reflection, and prayer.

I will be on Sabbatical Monday, June 24th to Sunday, August 25th. The focus of my time away will be personal health and self-care. In the past, I have rarely prioritized my own health and well-being, and the busyness of work and family have given me "excuses" to eat poorly, skip the gym, and forgo spiritual practices that take time and effort. Small changes have not worked so a significant reset is in order. I plan to take time to reset my diet, physical activity, and mental and spiritual practices with the goal of having more energy and focus on my return. I believe this time will not only benefit myself, but my family, and my role as your pastor.

During these two months, I will step away from UCH entirely. Rev. Debbie Ingram, our former bridge pastor and good friend will serve UCH as Sabbatical Coverage Pastor. She will be responsible for pastoral care and

visitation, Sunday worship, and other pastoral responsibilities that arise. Members of the congregation will work together to cover other day to day operations.

I am thankful for the Personnel Committee and the Board of Directors for helping me think through this sabbatical plan and for recognizing my desire and need for healthier living. I am also thankful that this faith community is able to offer this time away for rest and resets.

There is still much work to be done between now and the beginning of the sabbatical. One major project is the summer youth service trip. You can find more information about this trip later in the newsletter.

Property Wetlands Restoration, Green Space, and the Playground

Wetlands Restoration

- * The project to restore the wetland behind the church that was scheduled for last summer was put on hold until this spring/summer, ironically, because of last year's rain and flooding. The work is now scheduled to begin in early May and is expected to continue into August.
- * The contractors will be using the area between the church and the Parish House to access the project area. The Little Free Pantry will be temporarily located on the south side of the Parish House during the construction.
- * The project is paid for through grants secured by the Lewis Creek Association.

Green Space

- * Work on the initial phases of a planned green space ("an area of grass, trees, or other vegetation set apart for recreational or aesthetic purposes in an otherwise urban environment") located adjacent to the wetland will begin once that project is near completion.
- * Donations made in memory of Paul Eddy and Sandy White will fund the initial phase which includes the purchase of trees and benches.

Playground

- * The playground, which was severely affected by the flooding, has been taken down and the parts stored behind the Parish House. Replacement parts have been purchased
- * It will be installed in a new location in conjunction with the wetlands project

"Baptist Lot" Conservation Easement and Solar Land Lease

Background

- * In 1876 and 1913 two plots of land located to the west of Silver Street and just south of the Hinesburg Community School and the LaPlatte River were deeded to the Baptist Society.
- * The land (17.3 acres) is primarily wetlands and cannot support any type of septic system because the water table is too high. Due to its location connecting to the town sewer system is not an option.

Conservation Easement

- * The USDA approved an application submitted by the church for a conservation easement purchase that will cover approximately 16 acres of the land; the church will continue to own and pay taxes on the property (taxes are assessed because the property is not used for religious purposes and is not contiguous to the land on which the church buildings sit).
- * A legal issue with a reversionary clause in one of the deeds has been resolved and the easement purchase will move forward over the next few months.

Solar Land Lease Agreement

* The church has entered into a land lease agreement with Cornerstone Renewables who will install six (6) AllEarth trackers on a portion of the Baptist Lot that is not included in the conservation easement. The church will receive rent in an amount that is equal to 5% of the dollar value of the net metering credits generated by the trackers. The rent will help to offset the \$800 per year in taxes the church pays on the property.

- Over 1200 perennials sold to 138 community members
- * \$10,045 raised
- 20 church members and friends dug plants, washed roots, and potted or wrapped them in damp newsprint

- Countless hours spent by Howdy Russell and Anne Donegan tending plants throughout the year, getting them ready for sale, and managing the whole operation

2024 Youth Trip

"Intro to Service"



Summer youth service trips were a hallmark program of the United Church of Hinesburg before the pandemic. For several years, youth from Hinesburg, Shelburne, Williston, Monkton, Bristol, and Starksboro would take time during their busy summers to provide volunteer service hours for non-profit organizations in New York City, Boston, Maine, Puerto Rico, and other locations. In addition to volunteering for worthy causes and programs, young people were provided with an opportunity to dig deeper into big issues like rural poverty, food insecurity, animal welfare, and emergency relief. Experiences like these are life-shaping and character forming.

That is why I am excited that we are restarting the summer youth service trip program this June. Ten of our young people will spend the week of June 16th in Boston, Massachusetts providing service and volunteer hours to a range of worthy non-profit organizations. Because this year's kiddos are young, our summer trip focus will be an introduction to service. Youth will have some say in the organizations that we work with. In the past, we have worked with animal shelters, a service dog training center, food pantries, racial justice organizations, LGBTQ youth centers, Just Peace organizations, watershed associations, free meal programs, and many others.

Youth Program Investment Fund

As a truly multi-generational church, we take joy in our children and youth programs. These programs have rebounded well after the pandemic and now need greater attention.

The Youth Program Investment Fund was established in 2017 through a bequest from the Polly Quinn estate. The fund is intended to support youth programming at the United Church. Consistent with other church investments, the funds are held in Socially Responsible Investments (SRI), which include companies that have positive environmental, social and governance characteristics. As of March 31, 2024 the fund was valued at \$20,217.
